

PIPEDREAMS, KCCM 91.1 FM, 9:30 p.m. Sundays April 11, "Music for the Season of Easter": organ and choral selections by John Rutter, J.S. Bach and others on theme of sacrifice and salvation.

April 18, John Scott, Master Musician of St. Paul's Cathedral: performances by and conversation with the talented and youthful director of the organ and choral arts at London's grandest church.

April 25, "The Organ of Oberlin": faculty and student musicians showcase one of America's foremost music schools.

May 2, "At the Meyerson": sounds of the spectacular new Fisk organ at the Meyerson Symphony Center in Dallas, with several organists and the Dallas Symphony.

Discussion on the establishing of nominating committees included that members must be voted into this committee. A Dean-elect was discussed, along with the duties associated with particular offices. A search in our by-laws and other sources will be instigated, with information to be brought to a future meeting.

A request for someone to write grants on behalf of the chapter was given; contact Margery.

Because of Easter, the newsletter deadline is early - April 2.

Several events were announced and included ATOS Silent Movie Night with The Sweet Adelines and Harold Lloyd's "Safety Last", April 30, May 1.

The meeting was adjourned with a thank you to Dr. David Childs for chairing the program and for extending the hospitality of Gethsemane Episcopal Cathedral. Thanks also to Judy and Lance Johnson and Ardis Witte for serving the lunch.

#### MINUTES OF BOARD MEETING,

3/21/93..6:30 Gethsemane Episcopal Cathedral.

The secretary's report as published in the March newsletter was read and accepted. Rod Rothlisberger is working on the Fund Drive letter. Joan Bystol will chair the Program Committee for 93-94.

The treasurer's report shows a \$1666.08 balance. There is also \$1035 in the grant money fund, which must be used by July 1, 1993.

Mercedes Roos and Marlys Herring had a follow-up meeting with Ann Zavoral and Arland Jacobson of Communiversity regarding the co-sponsorship of Dr. Paul Westermeyer. The total cost for registration, room rental, securing box lunches, mailings, and printing was handled through the Communiversity office, and amounted to \$842.43. Dr. Westermeyer's honorarium (\$250), his airfare (\$141), and some phone calls, postage and copying costs (\$17) are the responsibility of our chapter, for a total cost of \$408. These financial responsibilities were known early in the planning stages and the board and the chapter had previously authorized this spend-

The Town House of Fargo donated a room for Dr. Westermeyer. Additional in-kind contributions were a labeling session for a large mailing, transportation while in Fargo, breakfast, and many hours of personal time on Mercedes' part co-ordinating this event.

105 people registered, 93 actually attended. The evaluations reflected the name recognition of Dr. Westermeyer and the usefulness of the session; several suggested a faulty sound system.

Dean Margery Possehl thanked Carolyn Hensrud and Mercedes Roos for their work. Discussion followed: 1) should there be a "Dean elect"?

2) should terms of office be more defined in length of time? 3) do certain offices carry other automatic responsibilities? (e.g. Sub Dean automatically program chair.) 4) should there be a plan or policy as to who serves on nominating committee? (e.g. retiring board members). No action was taken, needs to be decided by the chapter.

There was a shared concern that no one is responsible for grant writing for our

chapter. Available monies must be identified, and deadlines for applications must be noted.

Michael Olson resigned as the AGO representative to the Lake Agassiz Arts Council, effective June 30, which is the end of the LAAC year.

KCCM (Minnesota Public Radio) has asked our chapter to co-sponsor a music listening contest in conjunction with a Trollwood Classical Music Weekend this summer. Rod Rothlisberger, Michael Olson and Marlys Herring have an interest and will meet with the KCCM staff for further information.

#### PAUL WESTERMEYER SEMINAR-PART II.

Part I of this seminar addressed the broad perspectives of the roles of clergy and cantor and was reported in the March Pipeline. Part II gave more precise information on those two roles and allowed time for discussion and actual service planning done in small groups. In part II Dr. Westermeyer addressed the several types of cantors.

THE CHOIR DIRECTOR AS 'CANTOR' .. 'If you have only one group to help lead the congregation in worship, the choir is that group. It is the group that practices for the congregation in a way the congregation cannot. A choir can be two or more people, perhaps four tenors and no sopranos - whatever you have in your congregation. Your choir should not be: a group which practices everything except what the people sing - or worse, a group which marches into church, sings an anthem, and then leaves. A choir serves in the following ways: 1) Practices first what help the congregation sing. 2) Alternates with the congregation on hymn stanzas to better help proclaim the text. 3) Sings what the congregation cannot sing. (e.g.introduces new music.) 4) Models breathing, phrasing, flow, and shape of the music.

THE ORGANIST AS "CANTOR"..."In our worship style the organist is basically the cantor. The organist: 1) controls the tempo of hymns and liturgy as well as articulation, spaces between notes, phrasing, breathing, and shaping of the text. 2) Alternates with the congregation on hymn stanzas.

- Plays voluntaries, preludes, offertories, etc.
- 4) Controls the pacing of the service; however, the pastor controls the pacing of liturgy. The cantor should be an enabler, not a stifler, to make singing central to worship. The pastor is not the cantor, nor should he or she mix the two roles. The musician leads the music. That is not the pastor's job. The two work together and help each other." ## The Ten Hymn-Playing Commandments by Vance Reese

Purpose

 During the performance of a hymn you shall have no other central focal point than the praise of God.

Text

 Use the graven image of the text as the guideline for what you do musically.

Preparation

 Do not entertain the vain notion that you do not have to prepare in order to play hymns well for worship.

Breathing

You shall observe proper rests in hymns; you
must take time to breathe at the ends of phrases
and at the end of a verse.

Articulation

Honor the soprano line by articulating it well.
 Honor good rules of articulation for the other
 parts as well.

MAY CHAPTER MEETING IS SUNDAY, MAY 16, 4:00 P.M....BYSTOL'S BACK YARD BASH at the home of Norm and Joan Bystol, 3701 Kennedy Street, Fargo

Tempo

 Do not kill the hymn by taking the tempo too fast or too slow.

Style

 Do not adulterate the hymn by attaching an inappropriate style to it either through a descant, free accompaniment or reharmonization.

Rhythm

 Do not steal time from the notes. Keep the rhythm steady to help the congregation feel secure.

Registration

Do not bear false witness against the organ.
 Keep a clear registration to help the organ communicate and lead effectively.

Listening

 Do not covet another congregation. You must play for the group you are accompanying. Do not force them into another mold. Listen to them and play accordingly. ■
