Marilyn Mason and Robert Plimpton will be the principal guest organists. This also marks the 15<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Petty-Madden organ in Jones Concert Hall. Baylor is blessed with 9 pipe organs on campus, five of which are in performance halls. The conference will be held February 8-10, 2009. To register for this event, contact Baylor University School of Music at (254)710-1417. The cost for the event is \$100.00.

Dr. Marilyn Mason will perform the Dupre "Stations of the Cross" and lecture on commissioning new music. Robert Plimpton, who served as the municipal organist in San Diego, overseeing the enlargement of the famed Spreckels organ, will play the Elmore Concerto for Organ, Brass, and Percussion. Monica Harper and Samuel Gaskin, two young, upcoming organ stars, will be heard in recitals. Bynum Petty, the builder of the McLane Organ in Jones Concert Hall, will return to give his perspective on his career as an organ builder and musician.

Baylor will also host a Pipe Organ Encounter for adults interested in a hands-on introduction to the Pipe Organ. This event will be June 1-5 at Baylor University, Waco, TX. # **Board Meeting Notes**



Thursday, December 18, 2008: The following members were in attendance: Ruth Strawn, Bill Tweten, Sonia Carlson, Alpha Roeszler, and Michael Olson. Two members of the program committee were also in attendance: Dawn Papenfuss and Sally Harmon.

A wonderful holiday potluck was enjoyed, including lefse and candy cane brownies.

A motion was made by Alpha, seconded by Ruth, to approve the November secretary's report. Motion carried.

A motion was made by Michael, seconded by Sonia, to approve the December treasurer's report. Motion carried.

### Here is said report:

Beginning balance in the checking account was \$1172.15. \$36 was received in membership dues. Expenses were incurred in the amount of \$500.52 for the Carol Sing. The new checking account balance is \$707.63.

Carol Sing expenses: \$100 fee paid to St. Joseph's Church; \$25.20 for postage to mail posters and other publicity; \$50 to Reta Stein for playing organ; \$50 to Dr. Kenyon Williams for playing percussion; \$50 to LaVonne Rustad for playing piano; \$50 to Julie Hardmeyer for directing the children's choir of St. Joseph's Church; \$50 to the Moorhead High Carolers for singing; \$125.32 to the Forum for publicity ads (which was quite a bit less than budgeted).

The original conventional CD contains \$5484.11, and the new flexible CD contains \$5000.

The grand total of all accounts is \$11,191.74.

There was a recap of the December 7<sup>h</sup> Carol Sing. Having the kids sing from the balcony was great. The space at St. Joseph's Church is wonderful, and Mike Nelson's instrument was very nice.

It was noted that different organists played in the October 19<sup>th</sup> Organ Spectacular and the December 7<sup>th</sup> Carol Sing. Quite a few of our members played between those two programs. It is always good to hear each other play! Mavis worked to make everything having to do with the Catholic concerns work out well. We could not read Christmas scriptures since we were in the season of Advent, but the readings were appropriate and very nice. We also knew that we needed to be out of the sanctuary by 4:00 because of other events occurring at St. Joseph's Church that same day. We also discussed the fact that the Concordia Christmas concert was at the same time – but, Concordia had four concerts if people really wanted to attend both events. Because of being at St. Joseph's Church, the Carol Sing was in the afternoon, where it has been in the evening for other years.

We discussed future sites for the Carol Sing – places we've been before as well as places we've not yet been.

If there are any ideas for the February 11th LOVE program, to email one of the program committee members: Carolyn, Mavis, Sally, or Dawn.

We had a discussion as to how to "do" AGO – the collaboration between the program committee and the board members. In some years, the board has served as the program committee. In other years, the two entities have been separate. We discussed the philosophy of spending money, particularly how it relates to the surplus from our regional convention in 2001. We need to have a budget for programs for the year, perhaps before the program year begins (or gets very far into the year). There is indeed a place for our own members, as well as a need for guest artists.

We discussed a possible Hymn Festival, and mentioned names of people to lead such an event: Mark Sedio, David Cherwien, John Ferguson, Robert Hobby, Wayne Wold, and Michael Burkhardt. This could be in lieu of a guest recitalist or in addition to a guest organist.

We mentioned that, because January 2 is the First Friday and is still during the holiday season, that we would wait for the First Friday lunch until the SECOND Friday in January, the 9, at noon at the downtown Fargo Fryn' Pan.

The meeting was adjourned at 1:17 p.m.

# Hymn Stories

## "We Three Kings of Orient Are"

After the War of 1812, Anglicans in America decided to establish their own seminary for training Episcopalian ministers. The Episcopalian General Convention voted to locate the school in New York City. But where in New York?

Clement Moore, son of New York's Episcopalian Bishop, was an up-andcoming land developer. He had recently become well-known because of a poem he had written, which began: "Twas the night before Christmas and all through the house....".

The popularity of his poem made his name a household word. The fame and increased income made him a more generous and sought-after layman. Moore owned a large estate in the undeveloped northern region of Manhattan. He referred to it as "a quiet, rural retreat on the picturesque banks of the Hudson." Hearing that the Episcopalians needed land for their seminary, he offered a portion of his estate, and thus was born General Theological Seminary. Moore, also a linguist and Hebrew scholar, became one of General's first professors, teaching biblical languages.

Some years later, a reported named John H. Hopkins, Jr., enrolled in this seminary. Born in Pittsburgh, Hopkins had matriculated at the University of Vermont before moving to New York to pursue legal studies. But he fell in love with the Lord's work, enrolled in General, and graduated from the seminary in 1850. In 1855, he was hired as the school's first instructor or church music.

Hopkins wrote "We Three Kings" as part of a Christmas pageant produced by General Theological Seminary in 1857. In 1863 it was published in his *Carols, Hymns, and Songs*. Interestingly enough, Hopkins most famous song was "We Three Kings" and came to be from the generosity of Clement Moore, another famous poet.
