REVIEW OF AGO CERTIFICATION MEETING

April 21, 1991

There were many community musical events on Sunday, April 211 However, for those people in attendance at the AGO meeting that afternoon, Becky teVelde had a fantastic presentation concerning AGO certification. The Five AGO exams are somewhat like standardized tests: Service Playing Test (SPT), Colleague (CAGO), Associate (AAGO), Choirmaster (ChM), and Fellowship (FAGO). In the first two listed exams, only playing is required; the other three exams are a combination of playing and writing. The first two exams are tape-recorded at a local church (not where one usually plays) with a proctor. The other exams are taken at a regional examination center. For the AAGO and FAGO exams, there is about 45 minutes of playing, plus two three-hour written tests (the written part can be taken anywhere, according to my notes). Becky mentioned that a person should take a test he/she knows can be passed! Some of us should consider taking an AGO exam for the coming year. Requirements for next year will be found in the July 1991 TAO. Read that issue, then decide for yourself_

AGO REGION VI CONVENTION

Preparing the Organist of the 21st Century" has been the focus of over 24 months of planning by the South Dakota Chapter's committee for the AGO Region VI Convention, to be held in Sioux Falls, The June 16-19 event will include forums lead by Paul Westermeyer, much quoted pastor, theologian and musician, who teaches at Luther-Northwestern Seminary, in St. Paul, Minnesota. Speaking to his timely topic, he will encourage us listeners to review and evaluate our experiences as 20th-century-durch musicians. During the opening festival Service of Convocation, to be held Sunday, June 16th at 8PM, Westermeyer will deliver a sermon entitled, "It is a Good Thing to Sing Praises."

The 1991 Convention will also feature two loctures by pedagogue Wayne Leupold. The New York state resident will focus our attention on the music of Alexandre Guilmant, a pivotal figure in late 19th- and early 20th-century organ performance, composition and education. Leupold's annotated recital will include works by Guilmant and his circle; and, his second presentation will outline stylistic developments in the organ studies of Paris during the first four decades of this century.

Other aspects of creating "foundations for a professional future" will be covered in workshops on choral techniques and repertoire, historic and contemporary improvisation styles, effective use of instrumental resources other than organ, a podagogy for traditional and non-traditional organ students, the role of acoustics in successful musical leadership, and developing local support for the Guild's program.

A major part of any convention experience is the time spent in making and renewing collegial relationships with former classmates, old friends and new acquaintances. The executive committee took much care in scheduling events to include "networking" time whenever possible. Dialoging about shared aspirations, irritations and exultations can be a restorative charge for the months and years ahead. Lastly, hearing our Region's young performance competitors will let us celebrate careful preparation through technical training and artistic development.

Preparing as organists-both new and renewed-for the next century will be challenging and rewarding for us all, and it ought to be part of your Summer agenda this year. Send in your registration soon and I'll see you in Sioux Falls at the AGO Convention!

H. Joseph Butler is an assistant professor of organ and music at Ohio University. He has a D.M. A. and Performer's Certificate from Eastman School of Music. He also holds a M.M. in organ from New England Conservatory and a B.A. magna cum laude from Bowdoin College. In 1975 he won the New England Regional Young Organists Competition; he has also been a finalist in several national organ competition; he has recorded for Pro Organo Records, and has had articles for The Tracker, Journal of the Organ Historical Society. His organ teachers include Russell Saunders, Yuko Hayashi, Bernard Lagace, Harald Vogel, and Marion Anderson. He is Dean of the SE Ohio AGO and is organist at the First Methodist Church in Athens, Ohio.


SUMMER ORGANIST NEEDED
