YOUNG RECITALIST... by GEORGE FRENCH

Michael Budewitz, a 17-year old native of St. Paul, played an organ recital at the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception in Crookston, Wednesday, August 26. Mr. Budewitz played a fine program before an audience of about 200.

The program opened with two large works by J. S. Bach: The Prelude and Fugue in D Major and the Trio Sonata Number 2 in c minor. Mr. Budewitz appeared somewhat nervous during the Prelude and Fugue which resulted in tempos which were too fast and a lack of clear articulation and phrasing. Some of this nervousness carried into the Trio Sonata, particularly the third movement. However, his technique is outstanding and at no time did he appear to be out of control. The second movement of the Sonata was played with much expression and nuance.

Next was the Sonata Number 2 by the German composer Paul Hindemith. Mr. Budewitz missed the mark on the first movement by playing it too fast resulting in the piece sounding like a technical exercise. However, the folk-like second movement was played beautifully (although still a touch too fast for my taste), and the last fugue was a perfect example of clear execution and exceptional choices of registration.

The rest of the program consisted of music by French composers Jehan Alain, Jean Langlais, Cesar Franck, Maurice Durufle, and Charles Marie Widor. Almost without exception, Mr. Budewitz played these pieces with amazing technique and beautiful expression.

The Litanies, Opus 79 by Alain is to be played with much vigor in contrast to the Postlude pour l'Office de Complies, Opus 21 which is to be played softly and expressively. In both cases, Mr. Budewitz played with maturity which made one forget that he had just graduated from high school.

The highlight of the evening was the complete Symphony V, Opus 42 by Widor. This huge work is seldom heard because of the length and level of difficulty, but it did not present a problem for Michael Budewitz. He played it like a pro and deserved the instant standing ovation and bravos from the enthusiastic audience.

Michael is the student of John Vanella who is the newly appointed Organist and Director of Music and Liturgy at the Crookston Cathedral. John is obviously proud of this student and should be since Mr. Budewitz has a promising career in front of him. I could not help but think that I had the chance to hear a future "major league" concert artist. Michael has won several awards and prizes in various performance competitions. He now goes on to study organ at the University of Michigan.

Finally, it is always a treat to hear the superb organ at our Cathedral which is without a doubt one of the finest organs in northern Minnesota. I fell in love with its beautiful rich sound the first time I hear it and am still excited about this outstanding installation. We are indeed fortunate to have several beautiful organs in Crookston...(George French is Assistant Professor and Director of Music and Theater at the U of M-Crookston and also organist at Trinity Lutheran in Crookston.)
