This program is intended to help all of us by providing the names of our "Top Five" favorite "easy" organ pieces. It is a program for both new organists who want to be exposed to a large quantity of easy, but tasteful, organ music, as well as for the accomplished organist who needs occasional selections that can be learned in a hurry. We presume that all of us will continue to work on challenging pieces. However, practicality demands that we have a repertoire that includes music that can be played on short notice.

Sc, what do we need from you? By March 8th, send or phone:

- 1. A list of your top five tried and tested easy organ pieces. It should be music that can be learned in a few hours or possibly even sight-read. Please bring a copy of each piece with you to the program.
- 2. An indication of whether you would be willing to play a couple of your selections on March 25th.

This will be very casual and we would like as many members of AGO as possible to play. Pieces can be introductions to hymns, preludes, offertories, postludes, seasonal selections, etc. You may also choose pieces that include other instruments. A reception will follow.

At the program, we will provide a master list of the choices. We will also have copies of the selections to preview.

#### FROM THE DEAN

Imminent this month is Chapter approval of our Chapter's Standing Rules. Hopefully you have received and read your copy, and voted your This is more of a housekeeping acceptance. procedure than anything else. For the most part our chapter's activities and functioning have historically been in keeping with AGO Bylaws. However as an extension of the larger organization, it is good for us to define our operating procedures and to actually have a document to refer to when questions arise. The Red River Valley's Standing Rules will be reproduced in our Yearbook, annually, beginning this Fall, our 50th year. For someone new to our organization, or for someone contemplating accepting an elected office, it should prove helpful in identifying our mission and responsibilities.

Voting for Chapter Officers will be done in April also by mail. It is hoped that this will give all of you an opportunity to vote.

Our membership continues to grow, even as we go to press. Our membership is officially at 82, but there are two more in the process. It is very important that we each reach out to individuals who are responsible in any way for church music; invite them to join. Please note that during the months of February and March, all dues categories are reduced by 25% for new members. All privileges remain the same.

We have also had a good response to our letter inviting donors to financially support our activities. These donors will be acknowledged in an upcoming newsletter.

The Regional Convention in Kansas City is a month closer. I hope you all have taken the time to read the brochure we received from the Greater Kansas City Chapter outlining the activities. This convention looks as good as any offered around the country, and when one considers the large slice of the Midwest that this Region serves, it just has to be a good time. Speak up if you have hopes of going so we can pair up in sharing rooms, rides, etc. I have done some checking on transportation costs. If you fly on Saturday you get the benefit of staying Saturday night and the cost is \$396.00. You can do your Sunday morning, catching a 12:55 P.M. flight out on Sunday, arriving Kansas City at 4:16 P.M., for \$584.00 We could also carpool, leaving early Sunday morning, arriving in comfortable time for the opening events Sunday evening. For several of us our savings would be considerable by renting a minivan or Club Wagon. What would be really fun would be to rent a minibus with driver and go in style, leaving the driving to someone else! We can also keep in mind fellow AGOers in Sioux Falls and points south. The cost would depend on our numbers. So speak up so some organizing can be done.

Note, too, that a call has gone out to us for a sharing of music for the March 25th program. We all have a need for some new, practical music which can be adapted to all organs. If you share your tried, tested, and accessible music, we may all come away with some new titles.

On my computer, I have a button - F7 - that I can push to reorganize my words. But not only words: with one tap, words, spaces, sentences, and whole paragraphs jump around into a new order. In an instant, all is realigned into a new format - neat, tight - quite different from how it was. This week I watched a family and many, many friends reeling from the reformatting which had occurred when God reached into our lives and took a young, vibrant, promising 22-year-old home. The ripple effect started instantly and will continue for years as we recognize his impact on our lives. We take much for granted. #### PIPE ORGAN MUSIC ON KCCM 91.1 FM MARCH 2ND - 8:00 P.M. Regional Artists in Concert

The first half of the program features **Dr. David Childs** who is chair of the Concordia College Music Department. He performs pieces by Marcel Dupre, Pierre du Mage, and Joseph Rheinberger. The concert took place at Bethesda Lutheran Church, Moorhead, on September 12, 1993 as part of a service to rededicate the church's Hillgreen-Lane organ.

In the second half, Michael Olson, organist at First Lutheran Church, Fargo, performs pieces by J. S. Bach, Flor Peeters, Frederick Swann, Michael Burkhardt, John Bull, and Richard Ellsasser. The concert took place at the historic Eksjo Church, 7 miles east of Hawley, on October 17, 1993, in celebration of the rebuilding of the Reuter organ.

Both pipe organs were rebuilt and enhanced by Johnson Organ Company of Fargo.

#### PIPE ORGAN ENCOUNTER

The Sioux Trails Chapter of AGO will sponsor a Pipe Organ Encounter July 9-14, 1995, at Martin Luther College, New Ulm, Minnesota. POE '95 will feature daily lessons with area college teachers and professional organists, including Dean Billmeyer and John Eggert from the Twin Cities, Karen Larson from Wartburg College in Iowa, Jeffrey Daehn from Zumbro Lutheran in Rochester, and Norma Aamodt-Nelson from Augsburg Fortress Publishers. Students will have an opportunity to hear Douglas Cleveland, winner of the 1994 AGO National Competition in recital. Students will also attend classes on a wide variety of pipe organ topics and take a tour of the Hendrickson Organ Company. There will also be field trips to significant new and historic organs in Mankato and St. Peter. The week will conclude with a student recital.

Students between the ages of 13 and 20 with some keyboard background (i.e., a Bach <u>Invention</u>) are eligible to attend. A fee of \$185 will cover tuition, meals, lodging, and all related expenses. In the Bach Museum in Eisenach, J. S. Bach's birthplace, lying beneath these notes:

is an inscription which reads:

"The beginning and the end of all music"

In 1950, two hundred years after his death (July 28, 1750), Bach's remains were taken to the Thomaskirche in Leipzig. Above the steps which lead to the choirloft there is now a plain, marble slab, bearing only the inscription:

JOHANN SEBASTIAN BACH

"That is all: no date, for Bach is ageless; no epitaph, for none is needed." (Percy M. Young)
