FARGO FIRM TO CONSTRUCT LARGE PIPE ORGAN: The Johnson Organ Company, Inc. of Fargo, ND has been commissioned to build a new three manual, forty rank pipe organ for Voorhees Chapel at Jamestown College. The organ was made possible by a gift by the Schlossman family in memory of William A. Schlossman, founder of West Acres Shopping Center and George Black, father to Mrs. Schlossman, who owned a department store in Fargo. The organ will be one of the largest in North Dakota.

This organ will have a unique feature of reflecting the tonal designs of the three major schools in organ building (English, French, and German) geared to help organ students understand how the various schools of literature are to sound.

The organ will be fully computerized and will be used for chapel services, ensembles, concerts, and organ instruction.

With the completion for the fall of 1999, the project is the largest ever undertaken by the Johnson firm which is in its forty-fifth year having begun operation in Fergus falls.

Organ Workshop and Organ and Trumpet Recital: The Missouri Valley Chapter of the American Guild of Organists is pleased to invite you to an organ workshop on Thursday, October 15, 1998, at the First Presbyterian Church in Bismarck, ND. The workshop will be held from 5:30 to 8:00 p.m. at a cost of \$15.00 for adults and \$10.00 for students. A light supper is included in the registration fee. The guest clinician will be Paul Klemme.

On Saturday, October 17, 1998, Dr. Klemme will be joined by trumpeter, Gerald Webster, to present a trumpet and organ recital at 2:00 p.m. at First Presbyterian Church in Bismarck. The duo concert, entitled "Musical M&M's" will feature music by Martini, Mendelssohn, Plog, Mahler, Moureau. Admission for this afternoon concert is \$5.00 for adults and \$3.00 for students. A Treasure in Our Congregation

Excerpts from an article by Pastor Mark Strobel in the "Glyndon Lutheran Chronicles" October 1998.

During the past summer, Alan Ball, our organist, and I were talking about the history of our church's pipe organ. Alan knew that the organ had been installed at Norwegian Lutheran Church in Portland, ND at the beginning of the 1900's. Beyond that, there was little information about its history and how it came home here in the late 60's. Thanks to the internet, The Organ Historical Society (OHS) has given us some more information. The organ was originally built for Norwegian Lutheran Church in Portland in 1920. The Boston company Hook & Hastings built the organ. Jerry Morton from OHS says, "You are lucky to have an organ by the firm of Hook & Hastings, which is arguably the finest organ building firm this country has produced. The company was in its prime from the 1860s through the 80s." Hook and Hastings closed in 1933.

Sometime in the 50's the church replaced the organ and Phil Felde in Moorhead purchased it. Lance Johnson, a Fargo organ builder and the man who installed the organ here in the church, says that Mr. Felde had the organ in his garage and used to invite friends over for organ concerts. Our congregation bought the organ and installed it in 1966. The original contract for the organ lists a price of \$2250. When we bought it used in 1966 we paid \$2200. What surprised me was to hear from Mr. Morton of OHS that the replacement cost of the organ "would probably be in the neighborhood of \$200,000." The labor costs of a local organ building firm might be less and Mr. Johnson believes that replacement cost of the organ might be in the neighborhood of \$125,000.
