As a member of the Lake Agassiz Arts Council, we have again been invited to be present at the Moorhead New Educators Reception, Wednesday, September 21st, at the Heritage Hjemkomst Center. This is an opportunity for all the local arts organizations to make themselves known to new teachers and faculty of Moorhead private, public, and university schools. Along with the Johnson table-top organ, we will have AGO brochures, copies of our 94-95 programs, copies of TAO, and two free passes to the Fargo/Moorhead Community Messiah Sing-Along.

As of August 31st, 42 memberships had been received. I am heartened by this response! At the same time, in a perfect world, all would-be members would be on board by now. My heartfelt thanks to John, Carolyn, and Brad who process all this information in very short order and get our yearbook into our hands within a month's time. Regarding membership, last year the Red River Valley Chapter had 73 members; there were 356 chapters nationally, with a total of 19,792 voting members, and 1,800 more non-voting.

Looking ahead, the success of a large undertaking like the Fargo/Moorhead Community Messiah Sing-Along depends largely on our involvement and the verve with which we spread the enthusiasm and the commitment. We must plan ahead, and encourage and inform our church choirs, fellow musicians, friends, neighbors, and students to become involved, even if only to attend. This will be a wonderful opportunity to hear and be a part of a community effort—a community which has become used to having as residents some of the Midwest's finest musical professionals—a community which, over the years, has learned to expect the highest artistic offerings.

But first, we kick off our year in Grafton. Hopefully we will have a lovely, late summer day. We'll make it an even better event by having a great turnout, so, "Y'all Come!" Check the specific details on the first page of this issue, bunch up in carloads, and let's have a good time.

BOARD HINUTES, RRV CHAPTER, ACO, 8/5/94

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The executive board of the Red River Valley Chapter-AGO met at Gethsemane Cathedral, Fargo, August 5, 1994 at 7:00 PM, in the Fireside Room. Members present: Marlys Herring, Jay Hershberger, John Jahr, Dawn Papenfuss, Robert Hachmeister, Carolyn Hensrud, David Childs, Bradley Steen, and Craig Proehl.

Meeting was called to order by Dean Marlys Herring. who gave all assembled a warm welcome, and invited input as the board launched into a new year. It was announced that Mary Tangen will serve as secretary, and Robert Hachmeister as Pipeline editor. The Secretary's Report from the May board meeting was read and approved (see August Pipeline). The Treasurer's Report was presented by outgoing treasurer Craig Proehl (the Financial Report for 1993-94 was in the treasurer Craig August Pipeline). Old business: it was decided that Norm Hansen's request to repeat his survey from last year need not be done; the dean indicated that much of the material in her possession would be put in the Chapter Archive housed at Moorhead State University. New business: discussion of the importance of having a 1995-96 budget committee; Jay Hershberger was asked by the dean to chair that committee, and that John Jahr serve on same; so moved by dean Marlys, seconded by Davild Childs; passed. Rod Rothlisberger has been appointed Minnesota District Convenor (Aug. Pipeline).

Marlys announced some poeple needs of the Chapter: since it is important for the Chapter to save copies of newsletters, programs, and other materials that document the Chapter's history, an Archivist is needed; Professional Concerns and Hospitality need people.

Jay announced that he is trying to organize an organ crawl for the people of Gethsemane Cathedral. This would be laity education to raise awareness in people's minds about moving forward with the new pipe organ project. He hoped the Chapter could be involved in some way.

Dawn gave an overview of the exciting program year, planned with events of wide interest that would appeal to many (August <u>Pipeline</u> and "insert" in this issue). The importance of publicity was again emphasized, as was searching out various grants that are available. David moved, Jay seconded, thay the Chapter split the cost of the <u>Messiah</u> Sing-Along with First Presbyterian Church; passed. Jay moved, Marlys seconded, that the Chapter give Rene Clausen a \$400.00 honorarium for facilitating the choral reading session in January; passed. Marlys moved, John seconded, that the Program Committee proceed; passed.

There was discussion of a proposal to change the format of our Chapter Yearbook for 1995-96. Next year will be our Chapter's fiftieth anniversary year, and the Yearbook could include more information, e.g., by-laws, etc. There was also discussion that our Chapter seriosuly consider the possibility of hosting the Regional Convention in 2001!

Marlys moved, Jay seconded, that we adjourn; passed.

The following appeared in the Newsletter of an AGO Chapter in Utah at an earlier date:

When the Chairman of the Board of Directors of a local symphony orchestra (who was also President of the largest corporation in the city) found he could not attend the next symphony concert; he gave his ticket to one of his employees (who happened to be a management consultant). Monday morning following the concert; the employee was asked if he had enjoyed the concert. Instead of the polite rejoinder expected, the Chairman was handed a memorandum which went something like this:

The Undersigned submits the following comments and recommendations relative to the live performance of Schubert's <u>Unfinished</u> <u>Symphony</u>, as observed under actual working conditions:

- 1. For considerable periods, the four oboe players had nothing to do. One player could perform all the work if it were spread more evenly over the entire piece, thus eliminating peaks and valleys of activity.
- 2. All 12 violins were playing identical notes with identical motions. This duplication of effort is unnecessary. The staff of this section should be drastically reduced. If a larger volume of sound is required, it could be obtained through electronic amplification which has recently attained high levels of fidelity.
- 3. Much expertise was required in playing sixteenth notes or semiquavers. This seems an excessive refinement beyond the ability of most listeners to appreciate. It is recommended that all notes be rounded to the nearest 8th. If this were done, the orchestra could use lower grade operators with no loss of quality.
- 4. No useful purpose would appear to be served by having the horns repeat passages that had already been handled by the strings. If this and all other redundant passages were eliminated, the clapsed playing time could be reduced by 35 percent with commensurate savings in salaries and overhead expenses.
- 5. In summary, if the first three movements had been written more concisely, Schubert probably would have had time to finish the Symphony.

MESSIAH SING-ALONG (Press Release)

AGO, in cooperation with the Abendmusik Concert Series is proud to present the first annual Fargo/Moorhead Community Messiah Sing-Along.

[The local orchestra has dropped annual performances of <u>Messiah</u> in recent years, and many people have commented that they have missed the Christmas time tradition.]

These two organizations are planning to hire the finest orchestra players in the area, along with the most well-known regional singers (such as Lucy Thrasher), and invite the community to serve as the chorus for an enthusiastic performance of Handel's oratorio masterpiece.

We expect several hundred singers to participate and invite you to enlist support of your churches and choirs. Remember, anyone can sing, regardless of their level of skill or background. No advance preparation is necessary.

The performance will be November 20th at 7:00 PM at First Presbyterian Church, Fargo. There will be a 45 minute rehearsal at 6:00 that evening. Participants will be asked to pay a \$4.00 (\$1.00 for students) fee to help underwrite the fees of the professional musicians. Participants may bring their own copy of Messiah or purchase a score of chorus parts prepared for the event for \$2.00.

DIMENSIONS OF AGO DALLAS 1994 Luther Frette -- Grand Forks, N.D.

A stereotype almost kept me from attending AGO Dallas 94. Somehow I had equated a national convention of the American Guild of Organists as strictly an elitist conclave. I envisioned groups of Eastman graduates discussing Mendelssohn's influence on the romantic period in organ literature.

Neverthless, a great experience at the 1993 Region VI convention in the Quad Cities heightened my determination to be a part of this year's Dallas event. As a result, on Saturday, July 9th, I found myself waiting at the Dallas-Fort Worth International Airport for a shuttle van that would take me to the Loews-Anatole Hotel.

An unexpected welcoming party greeted me at the hotel. The Brazil soccer team had just won a finals game, and players were leading an impromptu victory parade in the entrance forer. The unlikely pairing of soccer fans and church organists as hotel guests amused me often during that opening weekend.

Those days of AGO Dallas 94 became a fast-moving feast of recitals, worship services, and workshops. The two main competition events were intriguing. Hearing the finalists in organ improvisation reminded me of the sparkling bursts of creativity that are possible with the king of instruments. I found myself being an impromptu judge as I attended the competition in organ performance. The three finalists played the same four selections, and what proved crucial were the differences in registration and interpretation. The winner, Douglas Cleveland, perhaps claimed victory because of the tonal contrasts and verve that he brought to Ned Rorem's "Sunday Night." It was a fascinating performance.

The daytime recitals exuded variety. My favorite was Marilyn Keiser's recital at St. Thomas Aquinas Catholic Church. There seemed to be an immediate synergy between organist and audience. Each selection stood in bold relief with its own unique fusion of energy and registration. To me the program exemplified what every recital should be--a captivating appeal to listeners with diverse backgrounds. Too often organ recitals are sluggish because of their exasperating sameness. In the process the most dynamic instrument becomes a bore. Well, there were no glazed eyes during Dr. Keiser's recital!

Rarely does a person have the chance to attend a symphony orchestra concert featuring the organ as solo instrument. It was a special treat, then, to witness the Dallas Symphony Orchestra as it hosted three organists--Mary Preston, David Schrader, and Jean Guillou--in an evening concert at the Meyerson Symphony Center. The jewel of that marvelous setting was the C. B. Fisk organ with its 4,535 pipes arranged in a spectacular facade. Each performance that night

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seemed to outdo the preceding one, leaving the audience magically transported to an incredible dimension of listening pleasure. For most convention organists, that exquisite evening easily formed the week's cli-

There are many terrific images of the Dallas mosaic that still linger in my mind. Discovering instant friendship with other organists as we met on the buses transporting us around Dallas. Sitting in beautiful church sanctuaries and thrilling at the various pipe arrangements. Feeling the drama of the many inspiring stained-glass windows. Talking with several teenage organists who offered preludes at the morning worship services. Sensing their wide-eyed wonder in being at the convention. Feasting on the stacks of organ CDs displayed at the exhibits. Listening to retiring AGO President James Hoeser as he gave a charge about the organist's role in worship. Seeing the Lone Star State flag flying outside the convention hotel.

Now what about the stereotype so linked with a national AGO convention in my mind? That July week in removed it. replacing happily misconceptions with an unforgettable experience.

Others who went to Dallas from our area: Marlys Herring and Mike Olson, Fargo/Hoorhead; George French and John Vanella, Crookston; Barry Wenger, Grand Forks; and Bill Wojnar, Jamestown.
