Message From the Dean

I have been the new dean of the Red River Valley Chapter of the American Guild of Organists since July 1-so it's been about two months as I write to you on Friday, August 25. I reflect upon the meeting we had in the Fellowship Hall at First Presbyterian Church in Fargo on Tuesday evening, May 16 when we discussed the future of the chapter. After a wonderful potluck meal, we "got down to business" and had a conference call with Marilyn Schempp, the North Central Regional Councillor of AGO. We discussed many things, and it was a very good, productive meeting. At the end of the evening, we decided to keep our chapter intact and to plan several activities for the coming season.

On Saturday, September 9, we will have a presence at the Concordia music workshop (their second annual event last year's event was wonderful, for those of you who were and weren't there). I have been in contact with Peggy Johnson, organ instructor at Concordia, who has allowed us to have a table to promote our upcoming activities and to recruit new members to our organization.

I don't know the exact date for the December event, but I'm guessing that it will be on Monday evening December 4 (time TBA) at First Presbyterian Church in Fargo. This will be our annual Christmas Carol Sing in conjunction with the Fargo-Moorhead Area Music Club and their Noteables choir and perhaps a bell choir as well. This is always a very fun event, and you'll want to stay tuned as some of you may be asked to play a Christmas carol as part of the event! In February, Concordia will be hosting David Cherwien, one of the greatest church musicians in the Twin Cities (and the nation, for that matter). There will be a hymn festival at Trinity Lutheran in Moorhead on Friday evening, February 9, and a master class at First Lutheran in Fargo on Saturday morning, February 10. More information will be forthcoming concerning these events, but get them on your calendar now!. And in the spring of 2018, we will have our annual used music exchange and potluck supper, details of which will be forthcoming.

There will be other music offerings at various churches which will be publicized throughout the year. And if you have any events at your church that you want others to attend, please contact Ruth Discher and she'll make sure to publicize your events. This is a very captive audience for wanting to attend musical events of all kinds.

Besides serving as the dean of this chapter, I also wear another hat---North Dakota Convener for AGO. In years past, we have had four chapters in North Dakota. The chapters in Minot and Bismarck are currently not in existence. I would love to see an AGO presence in the western part of our state once again if it is possible. I have a very good friend who's a church musician at one of the ELCA churches in Bismarck. so I'm going to see if there might be interest in getting a chapter re-started in Bismarck. I remember about twenty years ago when several people were super-excited about getting a chapter started out there- and then the

Minutes of the RRV/AGO Board Meeting May 16, 2017

Minutes from March 2017 meeting were previously emailed to all members.

The chapter gathered for a potluck dinner and music exchange.

It was determined that a quorum of the membership was present for voting purposes.

Treasurers Report: \$4,231.68 in RRVAGO Checking Account. Membership Report: Eighteen (18) paid members— (regular 11, special 5, friend 1, dual 1, student 0).

Marilyn Schempp, Regional Councillor for the North Central Region of the American Guild of Organists joined us by way of telephone.

Michael Olson, our District Convener for the state of North Dakota for the American Guild of Organists was present.

The significant business of the evening's chapter meeting was the immediate short-term viability of The Red River Valley Chapter of the American Guild of Organists. There was a discussion on the challenges facing the chapter as well as potential solutions to these challenges. One of the options to be considered was voting to disband the chapter.

Challenges: Perceived high membership costs; online protocol for membership renewals difficult for some; growing the membership; member fatigue; changing tastes in church music; declining interest in studying music and organ in colleges and universities. (Continued on Page 3)

Solutions: More aggressive recruiting of potential new members to join and current members to renew their memberships; inviting current members to attend chapter meetings and events; implement membership incentives to young people and students; more aggressive use of social media to publicize chapter activities; collaborate with other arts organizations and churches to sponsor and promote arts activities of mutual interest and to the community at large; pursue outreach with the Northern Valley Chapter of the AGO to work together with them for both of our mutual interests and future viability. (Michael Olson will initiate some contacts with the Northern Valley Chapter.)

We were told that we did not need any Members-at-Large, so we didn't make plans to fill those positions.

We decided that all RRVAGO events would include a Chapter Meeting, and that board meetings wouldn't be scheduled on a regular basis.

We also talked about having the RRVAGO participate as a co-sponsor with any scheduled organ events in the community that welcomed us.

A motion was made by Susan Clambey and seconded by Michael Olson to invite local organ students to become student members of the Red River Valley Chapter of the American Guild of Organists and the RRVAGO chapter will pay the first year of their student membership.

The motion was discussed and passed unanimously on vote.

Peggy Johnson will initiate recruiting AGO student members among her organ students at Concordia College. Other music teachers are also encouraged to do likewise.

Discussion took place regarding the RRVAGO Board for the 2017-2018 program year. Volunteering to stand for election are: Michael Olson, Dean; Robyn Vinje, Sub Dean; and Bradley Steen, Secretary/Treasurer.

David Cherwien is scheduled to be in residence at Concordia College, Moorhead, MN February 8-10 in 2018. Concordia College Church Music Conference is scheduled for Saturday, September 9, 2017, on the campus of Concordia College, Moorhead, MN.

Membership Renewal Notice

Federal Trade Commission

On May 26, the Federal Trade Commission announced that it had approved a final order and consent agreement in which the American Guild of Organists agreed to eliminate rules that restrict its members from competing for opportunities to perform. Detailed information is available on the AGO website and published in TAO. AGO chapters have six months to comply with the terms of the Decision and Order.

As noted in an earlier FTC press release about this matter: "The Commission's consent order requires the American Guild of Organists to stop restraining its members from soliciting work as musicians, and to stop issuing compensation schedules, guidance, or model compensation. The Guild must implement an antitrust compliance program, and is required under the order to stop recognizing chapters that fail to certify their compliance with the order's provisions."

To demonstrate compliance with the terms of the Settlement Agreement that the AGO entered into with the Federal Trade Commission, one current officer of each domestic Guild chapter must execute a brief certification form on the chapter's behalf. As of July 14 we have received approximately 25% of the way to our goal of 100% compliance. The two-page form can be found on the AGO website. The executed form can be forwarded to Headquarters as a pdf file by e-mail, fax (212-870-2163) or surface mail.

Dr. Melanie Ohnstad has been in the field of church music since her graduation from St. Olaf College in 1974. Her If first position was at St. Stephen Lutheran Church in Wausau, WI, where she served as Organist/Choir Director and was leader of the Luther League and an interdenominational youth choir. A move to Phoenix brought with it the completion of a Master of Music in Organ Performance (ASU) and the post of Organist/Choirmaster at Trinity Episcopal Cathedral. Melanie played organ with the Phoenix Symphony and collaborated on a recording, 20th Century Music for Horn and Organ.

Since moving back to the Midwest, Melanie earned a Doctor of Musical Arts from the University of Minnesota. She has held her current position as Minister of Music and Arts/Organist at Westminster Presbyterian Church in Minneapolis for 22 years. Melanie enjoys accompanying choirs and soloists and has a passion for bringing the arts into liturgy and enabling congregational members to share their gifts in worship. She was dean of the Twin Cities Chapter of the American Guild of Organists when it hosted the National Convention of 2008. She has accompanied multiple choir tours to the British Isles and recorded several CDs with area choirs.

Melanie is grateful for the opportunity to perform at First Presbyterian Church, Fargo, longtime church home of her parents, Mons and Joy Ohnstad. Concordia/Gethsemane Cathedral to Host Philip Bisson Concert

Thursday, November 9, 2017 at 7 p.m. Concordia College and Gethsemane Episcopal Cathedral will be hosting Dr. Philip Brisson for an organ recital at **Gethsemane Cathedral in south Fargo**. Dr. Brisson is Director of Music and Organist at the Catholic Cathedral of the Assumption in downtown Louisville, KY, the third oldest Catholic Cathedral in continuous use in the country. In the summer of 2011, he was "Organist in Residence" at Christ Church Cathedral in Oxford, England and this past summer he performed on the L'Organo Recital Series at the Piccolo Spoleto Festival in Charleston, SC. In addition to his duties at the Cathedral, Dr. Brisson is also Organist and Associate Director of the Louisville Master Chorale. As an organ soloist, he has given recitals in 35 states and has appeared with the Louisville Orchestra as guest soloist. Philip Brisson is active in the American Guild of Organists and founded the concert artist cooperative EastWestOrganists.com, which represents several prominent young American organists in the United States. Composer's Corner

Contemporary Composers James Biery and Charles Callahan

JAMES BIERY (born 1956) is an American Organist who is Minister of Music at Grosse Pointe Memorial Church in Grosse Pointe Farms, Michigan. He was Director of Music at the Cathedral of St. Paul in St. Paul, Minnesota from 1996-2010. Biery was featured regularly as a performer on the Cathedral's monthly concerts. He and his wife, Marilyn, shared the organ and conducting duties at the Cathedral. Before moving to Minnesota, James Biery was Director of Music at the Cathedral of St. Joseph in Hartford, Connecticut, where he performed often on the 140 rank Austin organ.

Biery was educated at Northwestern University, where he earned Bachelor and Master of Music degrees in Organ Performance. Mr. Biery also holds the Choirmaster and Fellowship Certificates of the AGO. In 2006, 2007 and 2008 James Biery was awarded the ASCAP Plus award for his compositions. In 1986, he was the prize-winner for the highest score on the FAGO exam administered by the American Guild of Organists. The winner of several organ competitions, he was named Second Prize Winner in the 1980 AGO National Open Competition in Organ Playing.

Biery developed his compositional skills from two disciplines: years of study of the organ and its literature and intense scrutiny of the orchestral scores of numerous composers whose music he transcribed for organ duet and organ solo. As an organist, Biery has distinguished himself by performing much of the repertoire of the nineteenth and early twentieth centuries. His facility at the organ combined with his demonstrated ability to perform and study a vast amount of literature has given Biery a firm basis upon which to compose for the instrument. His organ and choral compositions are published by MorningStar Music Publishers, Concordia, Augsburg-Fortress, GIA and Oregon Catholic Press. He has recorded for AFKA and Naxos.

CHARLES CALLAHAN, born in 1951, is a native of Cambridge, Massachusetts. Callahan is well-known as an award-winning composer, organist, choral conductor, pianist, and teacher. He is a graduate of The Curtis Institute of Music, Philadelphia, Pa., and The Catholic University of American, Washington, DC. Additional study has been in England, France, Germany and Belgium. He holds the Associate and Choirmaster certificates of the American Guild of Organists.

Callahan compositions are performed frequently in church and concert; his writing style has been described by The Washington Post as "gentle, confident lyricism."

Among his notable compositions are two commissions from Harvard University and commissions from the Archdioceses of St. Louis and New York for Papal visits, scored for full orchestra, choir and congregation. His MOSAICS, a symphonic work in four movements for organ and orchestra, was premiered in the St. Louis Cathedral-Basilica.

Dr. Callahan is frequently asked to advise on the design of new organs and the restoration and improvements to existing instruments. His two volumes on American organ building history, The American Classic Organ and Aeolian-Skinner Remembered, have become standard reference works.

An active church musician and concert organist, Callahan has conducted many of the major choral works with orchestra and has performed on many of the great organs of the world. He has a dozen solo organ recordings to his credit. Callahan is an award-winning member of the American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers. He has most recently been honored by the American Guild of Organists with its 2014 Distinguished Artist award, "for his illustrious career as composer, performer, teacher and consultant, and his lifelong service to the sacred music profession."
