Message From the Dean

I am quite fond of the meditations of Susan Cherwien (wife of David) and want to share the following with you this month taken from the collection entitled <u>Crossings</u> (MorningStar Music Publishers):

As I reflect on this poem I am immediately drawn to reflect upon our Guild chapter. We too are in a season of change; a time of transition. Several years ago the RRVAGO presented a wonderful, exciting, regional convention. Memberships were at an all-time high, excitement was in the air, and hopes for the future abounded.

Reality has now set it. Memberships have declined at the rate of 18% for the past 4 years! The very technology that was meant to make our lives more simple has also served to drive us apart by keeping us more busy with other areas of our lives: at work 24/7 in some cases. We find we have precious little time to spend together with our families and our friends, let alone our professional activities such as the Guild. Yet it is by these professional relationships that we grow and nurture each other in our daily work. We share stories of mishaps and accomplishments, of new scores both good and bad, and we realize we are on a journey unique but also parallel to others.

So what does this have to do with RRVAGO? It seems that we (RRVAGO) are in the season of dark rest, a time of waiting as described by Susan. A look at our programming for this year supports this. We have an extremely limited number of RRVAGO-sponsored events scheduled. One could even argue that really NOTH-ING at all is being done at all in terms of bringing the organ into the RRV area. The reality is that we are keenly aware of our current situation and doing everything possible to continue to do business as we "re-tool" our image bringing it more in line with 21st century technology and concepts.

As an example at the September general meeting a motion was passed to limit the board to 3 at-large members rather than 6, bringing the total board size from 10 down to 7.



Board Meeting Notes



Since only five of the ten-member board was present, this was NOT an official board meeting but discussion took place on a variety of topics and issues. The minutes of the August 20, 2009 board meeting (which WAS an official meeting) were approved.

Bill is serving as interim treasurer. Since we have not had a treasurer since June 30, this is a three-month report:

Beginning balance in checking on June 30 was \$1103.72. Membership dues received since June 30 totaled \$706. One of our CDs matured, and the money was transferred to the checking account in the amount of \$5124.45. Expenses since June 30 included purchasing a gift card from West Acres for Sheila Baumgartner for all her hard work with the PIPELINE each month. National AGO dues in the amount of \$467.50 were mailed. The ad in the Wichita convention program book had not been paid for, and this has now been done (in the amount of \$175).

The current balance in the checking account is \$6291.67. Our other CD has a current balance of \$5648.51. The grand total of all accounts is \$11,940.18.

Michael and Anna will be in charge of the October organ recital and master class presented by Kim Kasling from St. John's University. Dr. Kasling's fee will be \$2500 (\$2000 for the recital and \$500 for the master class the following morning). Ticket prices were discussed. It was decided that adult tickets would be \$10 each, seniors would be \$8 each, and students would be \$5 each. We want the cost to be as reasonable as possible so that all will be able to come and hear this recital.

The organ recital is at 8.00 p.m. on Friday, October 30. The master class is from 10.00 a.m. to noon on Saturday, October 31. These events are at First Lutheran Church.

Peggy read through a list of committees and people to help in various areas. Some of those are as follows: archivist (with the items to be kept at Concordia); publicity (Carolyn Hensrud has done a lot of publicity over the years, and we would love to learn things that need to be done in this area); program committee (we discussed whether this should be done by the board members or if a separate committee should plan the yearly programs); education committee; competition

chair, yearbook and membership booklet, finance committee, hospitality, grant writing.

We have been a member of the Lake Agassiz Arts Council in the past. It was discussed that this group has undergone a name change, but we still need to have a presence in that organization.

During the 2008-2009 season we utilized local talent for our programs in observance of the International Year of the Organ. During this current season we are utilizing a regional recitalist (Kim Kasling) and are also discussing bringing in a national organist in the spring of 2010. We could not contract a recitalist for the spring since we did not have a quorum present to conduct business at this meeting. We are looking at Christopher Houlihan, currently a student of Paul Jacobs at The Juilliard School, to play here in the spring. Paul Jacobs was our last national artist, and he performed here in September 2007.

We discussed items to include in the monthly PIPE-LINE. We talked about The Organists' Corner where a different church and instrument could be featured each month, as well as the church organist and the music program of that church. We want to always include a calendar of events, especially those having to do with the organ. We need to list "positions available" each month. We realize that the substitute organist list is included in each year's membership booklet, but it would be good to have that list in the monthly PIPELINE as well. (Sometimes it is difficult to put one's hands on the membership booklet!)

Bill is going to check with the advertisers in the PIPELINE to see if they want to continue with ads in this year's newsletter. Individual members could have a business card for advertisement if desired, as the cost is fairly nominal.

The program year begins with a program this Sunday, September 20 at 3.00 p.m. at Gethsemane Episcopal Cathedral in south Fargo. Please bring music for the music exchange. Also, please bring CDs which will be sold at a very nominal cost, the proceeds of which will be used to support the AGO Annual Fund.

The next AGO board meeting will be Thursday, October 15 at noon at Boulger Funeral Home.

Knapp Appointed



Erich L. Knapp, a board member of the Red River Valley AGO, has just been appointed to the post of Minister of Music at Grace Lutheran Church in Wenatchee, Washington.

He will lead a vibrant multi-generational music program including conducting 5 adult and youth choirs, two handbell choirs, an orchestra, a brass ensemble, a recorder consort, a soon-to-be-established psalmodikon quartet, oversee a monthly professional concert series, and perform on the church's 2-manual, 15-stop tracker action Werner Bosch German Baroque pipe organ.

The church has a several-second reverberation time and is a primary venue for area performing groups, as well as touring ensembles.

Wenatchee is bordered on two sides by the foothills of the Cascade Mountains, and the roaring Columbia River on another, providing ample irrigation for the area apple, pear and cherry orchards and area vineyards. Wenatchee is touted as the "Apple producing capital of the World."

Knapp has recently completed a Masters in Music in Choral Conducting at NDSU where he has studied organ with Michael Olson. He leaves his position of Artistic Director and Conductor of the 70- voice auditioned Park Rapids Classic Chorale, a position he has held for 10 years. He has led the Chorale on three European concert tours (Germany, Austria, Czech Republic, Italy and Norway), which have also featured Knapp in organ recital. Professor Knapp also leaves an adjunct music teaching position at M-State in Moorhead.

Knapp's first assigned duty will be to lead the combined musical performing groups of the church in the celebratory services for Reformation Sunday. An active composer, he has already begun writing arrangements to be used at Christmas for the church choirs, brass ensemble, orchestra, and handbell choirs.
