First Update on Contemporary Worship

Because of the nature of our business and being acquainted with so many organists, I have been a lightning rod for those struggling to hold onto their positions. One organist has been to our shop five times in the past three years. Their stories of how they are being forced out of their organists jobs is heart-breaking. I will assume for now that those who thought I was too harsh have never had their positions threatened by those who promote alternative worship. In many cases, these people are actively forcing out organ music which they say is no longer relevant.

This past June, the Concordia organ camp for young organists had to be canceled because of low registrations. In talking with Peter Nygaard, Concordia instructor in organ, he days that the situation is "Dreadful" as more and more young people are being denied worshiping with organ and hymns. As churches continue to have only alternative services, their members have no choice but to worship in this style or transfer their membership. This service also brings in many young people but the outflow is such that membership can increase with new member who hold the organ in distain.

In October, I attended the national convention of the American Institute of Organ builders in Seattle, WA. Much of the discussion was what to do about contemporary service both in respect to both electronic and pipe. The spread of the alternative worship movement had taken Europe and England by storm. Some organ companies are facing bankruptcy from a sharp downturn in sales.

P&S Supply in England, a supplier of pipe organ parts is on the verge of closing. Only ten years ago, they were in a healthy condition expanding their line. Dr. Robert Ebert, chairman of the Economics Department of Baldwin-Wallace College told the assembled organ builders that the future is grim with the number of organ ranks of pipes produced in the US declining. Here is what Hans-Erich Laukhuff, CEO of Aug. Laukhuff in Germany has to say.

"Another reason for decreased demand for organs is what we call "Lifestyle churches" and the decreasing flock of faithful church goers who support traditional organ music, and who also ensure that their preference is reflected in church budgets. Classical music, especially organ music, holds little meaning too much of the younger generation who haven't been introduced to it. Could this portend the end of centuries old traditions? Gone are the days of excellent German education with curriculum that includes a wide range of musical and well rounded subjects. For these same reasons, high quality piano makers are experiencing falling demand. One is forced to wonder if the musical instrument making is becoming a sunset industry."

In the next *Pipeline* I will list examples of churches who have demonstrated how they are now treating organs and organists in the FM area which the expressed purpose of shutting down organs.

Board Meeting Notes

January 18, 2007: The meeting of the RRV AGO was called to order by Dean Victoria Wms Sieben. Those present were: Ruth Discher, Lance Johnson, Alpha Roeszler, Victoria Sieben, Ruth Strawn, Robyn Vinje.

Ruth S. moved to approve the Minutes from the November 16, 2006 Board meeting. Robyn seconded the motion and the Minutes were approved as written.

Lance presented the Treasurer's report for the 2nd Fiscal Quarter of 2006 (October 1-December 31). Income for the quarter was \$1,132.57: membership dues-\$219.00, Carol Sing-A-Long free will offering - \$818.37, Pipeline ads - \$95.00. Expenses for the quarter totaled \$1,034.58: LAAC dues - \$80.00, National dues-\$75.50, contribution to Emergency Food Pantry - \$818.37, miscellaneous (postage, printing supplies, etc.) - \$60.71. The checkbook balance is \$852.84. The amounts of \$3,000.00 and \$5,000.00 remain invested in the money market account and 11-month CD respectively, bringing the chapter's total net worth to \$8,852.84. Lance will report the interest earned to date on the money market account and the 11-month CD at the February board meeting.

Application forms for grants from the FM Area Foundation, Alex Stern Family Foundation and the Lake Regions Arts Council have been completed and submitted. Responses should be received in March 2007. Each request was for \$2500.00.

Lance is formulating a job description for the position of Treasurer and will work with his successor to gain a clear understanding of the duties of the Treasurer, including the procedure for filling out forms for grants.

Robyn presented a motion to approve the Treasurer's report. Ruth S. seconded the motion and the report was approved.

Old Business

- Paul Jacob's Recital Concentrated planning begins again for this event in February 2007.
- 2. 2006-2007 Programs Susan Clambey provided posters for distribution for the February 11, 2007 Wedding Music Program, to be held at Grace United Methodist in Moorhead at 4pm. Darcy Boltema has been confirmed for participation in the program. Carolyn Hensrud will do more advertising we are striving for great attendance. A budget for the program has not yet been submitted for approval. Vicky will contact Sally Harmon regarding plans for the Piano/Organ Duet Program and check on the possibility of having the March 25, 2007 program at Bethesda Lutheran.

- 3. List of Churches/Contacts Discussion on the Each One Reach One campaign centered on continuing to pursue the list of potential contacts. Lance and Robyn asked to choose people/churches to contact from the list that were familiar to them or convenient to their area. The remainder of the list will be divided among other Board members. A one-to-one contact was encouraged. Lance has several copies of a brochure from National that might be used to introduce prospective members to the AGO, if the brochure is applicable to our local chapter goals.
- 4. <u>Salary Guide Survey Response</u> We have received 19 responses. The survey shows a broad range of salaries throughout our area. A summary of the survey will be placed in the next Pipeline issue.
- 5. Recorded Music Committee Robyn presented a plan and goals for the formulation of an Electronic Music Ad Hoc Committee. Membership on the committee would consist of various area organists, church musicians, music instructors, clergy and/or others. The purpose of the committee would be to research the use of and policies regarding the use of electronic music in church services.

New Business

- 1. <u>Program Committee Appointments</u> Suggestions for members of the Program Committee to plan for the 2007-2008 season were presented by the Board. Vicky will contact prospects.
- 2. Region VI AGO Convention The Region VI Convention will be held in Lincoln, Nebraska in June 2007. Information for our chapter to advertise in the convention brochure was discussed. The deadline for submitting an ad is February 15th. Lance moved that we submit a ¼-page ad for the brochure at a cost of \$165. The motion was seconded by Robyn and carried by the Board.
- 3. Student Recitals Vicky drew our attention to some upcoming Concordia student recitals: Peter Rogahn will be presenting his senior recital on April 1, 2007 at Trinity-Moorhead at 4PM. Mark Sell will be presenting his sophomore recital on March 30, 2007 at Trinity-Moorhead at 7PM.

Robyn moved to adjourn the meeting. Ruth S. seconded the motion and the meeting was adjourned.

Pipeline Profile

Ruth Strawn, Board Member

I was born in a 14-bed hospital in Kadoka, SD on May 12, 1964. I was the third child and the only girl in my family. My dad was a Missouri Synod pastor serving a dual parish in Ka-

doka and Midland, SD.



While I was still a baby we moved to Scribner, NE, so my dad could serve another dual parish. We lived in the country—a little white parsonage next to a little white church. My mom played the organ quite often. We kids had to sit in the balcony with various

members keeping track of us during church. My mom taught piano to a few of our members' kids.

We had an old mahogany piano that my parents bought for \$25 and restored. We also had an old pump organ that my parents electrified. My brothers enjoyed playing a song on the organ they called, "Frankenstein Meets Mary Poppins." They would start on the low notes with the left hand and move up the keyboard. Then they'd start on the high notes with the right hand and "crash" in the middle.

When I was four-and-a-half, we moved to Gering, NE.

My mom taught me the basics of piano in first and second grade. I never really took formal lessons as a child, but I loved to try to teach myself to play various songs, and my parents gave me a great appreciation for classical music—especially the great chorales of the church.

When I was 12, we moved to Loveland, CO. In the fifth grade, I had started playing clarinet in band. I would go on to play through junior high, high school and for one year in college. Our high school band got to march in the Sun Bowl Parade in El Paso, TX on Thanksgiving of my senior year.

During high school, I sang in choir in school and in Youth Choir at church. I occasionally played the glockenspiel with our grade school choir at church, and once in a while I got volunteered to play one finger on the piano to accompany the opening of Sunday School.

I enrolled in Valparaiso University, Valparaiso, IN, in the fall of 1982, majoring in Nursing. While there, I was a member of Collegium Musicum—a madrigal choir—for one year. We put on a Madrigal Dinner during December—a traditional English Christmas meal, complete with medieval costumes and carols. It was great fun. I graduated from Valpo in 1986 with a Bachelor of Science in Nursing. (I went back for Homecoming this fall

and had the opportunity to play the Schlicker organ at the Chapel of the Resurrection.)

I began work as a nurse in Greeley, CO in the fall of 1986, I started taking piano lessons in the spring of 1988. I took them until the spring of 1990, when I decided to move to the Fargo area and take a job at Dakota Medical Center in the ICU. My brother—an LC-MS pastor—was serving the dual parish of Ada and Mahnomen, MN at the time. I lived in Hendrum, MN—half way between Fargo and Ada—for two years.

I moved to West Fargo in 1992. The piano kind of disappeared out of my life at this time.

In the spring of 1996, we were starting a new congregation of the WELS—I had joined the WELS when I moved to West Fargo—and we needed an organist. The church only had a keyboard at the time, and I hadn't touched a keyboard instrument in six years, but I got the idea that maybe I could play for services if I really worked at it. At the time, I could play the right hand, but the left hand was a real challenge.

The pastor in Moorhead gave me a hymnal, and his wife loaned me her keyboard, and I began to practice like mad. I had never played liturgy before, and I could only play one or two hymns. My mom got me some "easy" prelude music. Everything back then was difficult for me.) It took hours of practice to prepare for each service. I never went on vacation without my music. I was afraid I wouldn't be able to play if I didn't practice every day. In the fall of 2000, I started working in the Cardiac Care Unit (CCU) at Innovis Health. I was one of the first employees. I never knew how hard it was to start a hospital, but that's another story.

In the spring of 2001, our church finally got an organ—an Allen with two manuals and pedal. I tried to teach myself to play pedal, but it was very frustrating. One of our members knows Michael Olson and suggested I take lessons. I started lessons with Michael in the summer of 2003. I'm now playing pedal with all the hymns and liturgy, I've done several recitals at First Lutheran in Fargo. and I got up the courage to play for the AGO Carol Sing-A-Long this year.

I've come a long way. I can't believe the richness being able to play organ music has added to my life. God is indeed good. One never knows what opportunities to serve that He has in store.

Organist Salary Survey Summary

In October 2006 the RRV-AGO Board sent a copy of the areaadjusted Current Organist Salary Guidelines (based on suggested figures and methods of calculation presented by the National AGO) to each chapter member asking for participation in an anonymous survey to realize a fair representation of actual salaries for organists in our area that the Board could use as a tool to formulate realistic goals for professional compensation. We received 19 responses to the survey. The majority of responses were from organists with 20 or more years of experience and represented a very broad compensation range. Thank you to the members for their participation in the survey and their consideration of the survey's goals. The survey provided information useful in the Board's on-going discussion of this topic.
