Water Damages Fargo Organ Company

The Johnson Organ Company shop and office was flooded with 5" of water this past November 1. The water main coming into the building broke and was discovered by Dave Olsen who operates Valley Service in the same building when he came in to work at 6:30 AM.

The pipe shop suffered the worst damage as pipe parts were stored by the floor. An order of wood pipes for Holtkamp was spared as they were all up on saw horses. Machinery for the most part was spared being off the floor a sufficient height. Two

offset chests for the voicing machines, and a reservoir were severely damaged. The office carpeting was ruined and needed to be replaced. The project and service files escaped any damage but over 1,000 photographs had to be carefully dried out.

No new work was damaged as a two manual instrument had been finished just a month earlier.

The company was fully insured for this type of loss.

Letters to the Editor

I would like to thank the Pipeline and Lance Johnson for providing me with insight and understanding regarding the changes that have taken place in the quality of "sacred music" that I have observed in the last several decades.

Perhaps I should explain my background and life experience regarding worship and the music that accompanies it. When I first approached writing this letter I felt that since I was not a performing musician and since I have never been involved in providing music for worship I would be unqualified to comment on the subject. On further reflection I realize that opinions from a

"consumer" might have some credence in this exchange of ideas.

The first time I heard serious music was on a shortwave radio I had when in 4h grade. The first music I heard was the famous Bach Toccata and fugue in d minor broadcast by German radio. That sound went straight into my soul and from then on I rejoiced when hearing the sound of the organ and enjoyed only classical music. No Elvis, no Beatles and certainly no Joan Baez ever entered my ear without being rejected as "inferior" and unesthetic! My experience may illustrate that exposure to music at an early age can certainly set one's tastes for

life! How I loved to go to church each Sunday and hear the organ, sing those wonderful hymns and listen to the anthems sung by the choir! I was so fortunate to attend a church that had a good music program and an organist whose postludes taught me to sit and listen until the last chord quit resounding! Indeed I rejoiced to be in God's presence and I heard His voice through music; the one medium that can be great enough to communicate His love!

Board Meeting Notes

November 17, 2006: The meeting of the RRV AGO was called to order by Dean Victoria Wms Sieben.

Those present were: Ruth Discher, Lance Johnson, Victoria Sieben, Ruth Strawn, Robyn Vinje.

Lance moved to approve the Minutes from the October 19, 2006 Board meeting. Robyn seconded the motion and the Minutes were approved as written.

Lance was called on for the Treasurer's report. Two disbursements were made: \$80.00 paid for Lake Agassiz Arts Council membership dues and \$60.71 to Ruth Discher for postage and printing supplies for the Salary Schedule Survey.

\$5000.00 has been placed in an 11-month CD at State Bank & Trust and \$3000.00 has been placed in a money market savings account at State Bank & Trust. The checking account balance is \$742.88.

Lance is in the process of filling out applications for grants from the FM Area Foundation, the Alex Stern Foundation and the Lakes Region Arts Council in Fergus Falls to help cover expenses for the Paul Jacobs recital in September 2007. A late summer mailing will go out to surrounding colleges to help promote the recital as well. A request for donations from RRV AGO members will also go out.

Old Business

- Paul Jacob's Recital Dean Vicky Sieben has been receiving several communications, brochures, pamphlets, etc. regarding Paul Jacobs recital tours. Concentrated planning will begin again for this event in February 2007.
- 2. 2006-2007 Programs Copies of posters and bulletin announcements from Carolyn Hensrud and Marty Baumgartner for the December 3rd Christmas Carol Sing-A-Long were distributed to the Board members for posting in their churches or any other appropriate place. Planning of the event is in the final stage.

- 3. <u>List of Churches/Contacts</u> Work on this project will resume in January.
- 4. <u>Salary Guide Survey Response</u> We have received 13 responses. A reminder will be placed in the Pipeline to all RRV AGO members encouraging them to return their survey forms as soon as possible.
- 5. <u>Recorded Music Committee</u> Robyn will begin work on this project after the new year.

New Business

- 1. Newsletter Advertising Rates Lance moved that rates should be as follows: 1/8 page (business card size) \$50.00; 1/4 page \$75.00; 1/2 page \$125.00; full page \$200.00. Robyn seconded the motion and the motion was carried.
- 2. Program Committee It was decided that the Program Committee become active and start work in January to formulate the 2007-2008 program schedule. A discussion of ideas centered around presenting a series of workshops for new organists and those interested in transitioning from piano to organ, that could include basic hymn playing techniques, touring an organbuilding shop, basic registration ideas, suggestions for well-written easy organ literature suitable for smaller organs and churches, etc.
- 3. Ruth S. moved that the December 21^a RRV AGO Board meeting be cancelled due to the busy season for church musicians. Lance seconded the motion and it was carried. The next RRV AGO Board meeting will be held on January 18, 2007 at 4PM at the Boulger Funeral Home.

Lance moved to adjourn the meeting. Ruth S. seconded the motion and the meeting was adjourned at 5:00PM.

As a college student in the 60's I was a member of no church but attended regularly, sometimes twice on Sundays going from church to church in the Minneapolis area sampling the music programs. Every church I attended, indeed 90% of the churches in the metropolitan area, allowed the organ to reign supreme and allowed music to be the framework on which the worship service was supported.

Let us "fast-forward" to the year 2000 and observe the changes that have taken place in the presentation of music in worship. Remember, I am an "outsider" and am perhaps more able than some of you to see contrasts because I am not daily involved in worship planning and presentation. Daily the changes are small and perhaps hard to discern but my viewpoint is that the changes are shocking and of such a magnitude that everywhere I look today at "sacred music" I see mediocrity. I believed that the purpose

and duty of the church musician and of the product that they deliver is to lift up the hearts and souls of those who come together for the collective worship experience. I seldom see this anymore and I realize that this deterioration in quality is seen in all churches of all denominations.

It seems to many of us that the "contemporary" concept involves the use of musical idiom that will appeal to the average person. We don't want to aim "over another's head" and so we come down to their level. The path to the cross is not easy, it is not simple nor is it easy to understand. The concept of the Trinity is not easy for many to appreciate, nor is the idea of God sending His Son to die for us. Let's eliminate those concepts from our worship, shall we. After all, there are some who might have problems understanding!

Lance has helped me to understand a bit the evolution of the "contemporary" movement

in his writings. We need to reflect on what he says and we need to examine this question and not allow emotion or ego to alter our thoughts.

Most of the contemporary "music" presented in worship can be generated without a sentient human's intervention. CD's and Ipods and sound systems with huge mixing boards do a great job. I see the profession that we call "Church Musician" as becoming an almost extinct entity if the trend continues. Most importantly I don't see that young kid sitting in that worship space drinking in the sounds of that organ postlude until the last note fades! He can hear "rock" and the other common idioms of popular music anywhere, so why is the church musical experience special in any way for him?
