The Reuter pipe organ at Eksjo Lutheran Church of rural Lake Park has been converted to all solid state switching and combination action. The organ has more stop controls which have greatly enhanced the tonal resources. Mercedes Roos serves as organist.

At Dilworth Lutheran Church the Johnson tracker organ is being expanded to include a four stop Swell organ and an expanded pedal division. The original organ was built in 1980 for the old sanctuary which allowed only five feet of depth for the entire organ, precluding the Swell division. The new Swell will include the following.

Holzgedackt 8'
Rohrflote 4'
Prinzipal 2'
Schalmei 8'

The Pedal division will have a Fagot 16'. Completion is slated for Palm Sunday. Watch for an announcement concerning a re-dedication. Organists for Dilworth Lutheran are chad Winterfeldt and Sue Knorr.

The Elim Lutheran Church organ now has a brand new Trumpet stop. This rank is duplexed to play at 16' on the pedal and 8' on the Great. The pipes were installed by Johnson Organ Company, Inc. of Fargo and were built by Carl Giesecke & Sohn of Germany. Robin Vinje is the organist.

The rebuilt Kilgen pipe organ in Our Redeemer Lutheran Church in Moorhead has had a new Sesquialtera II added to the Swell organ. This stop, which consists of a $2\ 2/3$ ' and $1\ 3/5$ ' provides a new reedy color to the organ. The organist is Bill Tweten.

Gethseanne Episcopal Cathedral has recently contracted with M.P. Moller, Inc. of Hagerstown, Maryland, for a new three manual free-standing encased pipe organ with prepared Choir division. The organ is slated for year-end delivery which will coincide with the completion of the new church. The Nave is expected to yield 3 second reverberation when empty and 2 when full. Bruce Jacobs is the acoustical consultant. Proper acoustics for music and general worship are being stressed. Dr. David Childs serves as organist. (Submitted by Lance Johnson)

A memorial was presented for Krenek on February 9th in San Diego, California. Among other things, the program included selections from Krenek's Fifth Piano Sonata, vocal selections by various musicians and a complete performance of The Arc of Life, op. 234. Performers included Thomas Nee, Philip Larson, Carol Plantamura, Charlotte Selka and others. Ernest Krenek was a member of the University of California San Diego Department of Music. We extend our sympathy to Martha and her family at this time of hereavement.

Have you heard about John Meeley's DIRECTIONS FOR SINGING? Here they are, thanks to the Northeast Iowa Chapter The Clarion.

- Learn these tunes before you learn any others; afterwards learn as many as you please.
- Sing them exactly as they are printed here, without altering or mending them at all; and if you have learned to sing them otherwise, unlearn it as soon as you can.
- 3. Sing all. See that you join with the congregation as frequently as you can. Let not a slight degree of weakness or weariness hinder you. If it is a cross to you, take it up, and you will find it a blessing.

4. Sing lustily and with a good courage, heware of singing as if you were half dead, or half asleep; but lift up your voice with strength. He no more afraid of your voice now, nor more ashamed of its being heard, than when you sung the songs of Satan.

5. Sing modestly. Do not bawl, so as to be heard above or distinct from the rest of the congregation, that you may not destroy the harmony; but strive to unite your voices together, so as to make one clear melodious sound.

6. Sing in time. Whatever time is being sung be sure to keep with it. Do not run before nor sty behind it, but attend close to the leading voices, and move therewith as exactly as you can, and take care not to sing too slow. This drawling way naturally steals on all who are lazy, and it is high time to drive it out from us, and sing all our tunes just as guick as we did at first.

7. Above all sing spiritually. Have an eye to God in every work you sing. Aim at pleasing Him more than yourself, or any other creature. In order to do this attend strictly to the sense of what you sing, and see that your heart is not carried away with the sound, but offered to God continually, so shall you singing be such as the Lord will approve here, and reward you when he cometh in the clouds of heaven.

O HAVE YOU HEARD? The "Mighty Kimball" with 10,000 pipes is being reassembled in the new Minneapolis Convention Center with completion expected by the fall of 1993. Mike Rider, organ builder and restorer, is in charge of the work. Built in the '20s and said to be the largest Kimball from that era, the organ was pretty much forgotten by the 1980s when the city of Minneapolis decided to tear down the auditorium and rebuild (except that Mike Rider remembered).
