INTRODUCTION:

What is a commemoration? Why is today significant in the church? Who is commemorated? Let's take a look at the source that provides us with this information and more:

"The Evangelical Lutheran Worship (ELW) provides us with of 95 commemoration dates. These days illumine various aspects of the church's life and mission by attending to the lives of women and men who have followed Christ in succeeding generations.

These men and women are fascinating folk: lay and clergy, poor and rich, some who resided in historic Christian locales and others in new mission fields, martyrs, theologians, monks, nuns, scholars, authors, artists. These persons developed doctrine and renewed the church and improved society and nursed the sick.

The date the church uses for commemorations is usually the person's death date, the date on which she or he was born to eternal life."

Today, we commemorate Johann Sebastian Bach, Heinrich Schütz, and George Frederick Handel, musicians of the church. They are commemorated on the anniversary of Bach's death – July 28th.

"Many Christians value great church music as indispensable for profound communal worship. Bach's contribution to church music is especially in his organ compositions and his several hundred cantatas that were based on the gospel reading for the day; Schütz's contribution is largely in choral settings of biblical texts; and Handel's is the oratorio *Messiah*. The work of these three musicians continues to inspire churches to maintain high standards for music at worship. *Evangelical Lutheran Worship* includes eight hymn settings by Bach, one by Schütz, and one by Handel."²

"The aim and final reason for all music should be the glory of God and the refreshment of the soul; where this is not remembered there is no real music but only a devilish hubbub."






Cantor: O Lord, I call to you; come to me quickly; hear my voice when I cry to you.

When [musical] learning is added to all of this and artistic music which corrects, develops, and refines the natural music, then at last it is possible to taste with wonder (yet not to comprehend) God's absolute and perfect wisdom in his wondrous work of music.





Give us this day our daily bread; and forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us; and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil.




